

ISVS meet to focus on eco-related issues

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The main initiative of Vishwa 2009, an international level Exhibition and Conference to support eco-friendly business solutions, is not only to highlight environmental problems but also finding its solution and most importantly implementing them.

The feature of this three-day conclave from December 18-20 promoted by the Institute for Studies in Vedic Sciences (ISVS) is to impart necessary education at the grassroot level, while identifying solutions for the environmental dilemma the earth has been experiencing.

"We don't want to highlight any specific problem, because the problems are very much there, we are focusing on the solutions and how they can be implemented. We aim to teach from the basic and create a neutral platform where everyone could come together and learn," says Yogendra Vora, convener of ISVS.

Vishwa 2009 will be bringing together experts from diverse fields offering ideas, innovation, while discussing issues like global warming, waste management climate change, vegetarianism, hybrid tech-

nology, healthcare, nuclear energy, energy crisis, pollution. Participants will also get an opportunity to interact with speakers, including Almitra Patel and Col Madan Deshpande of the ISVS.

The ISVS also plans to start Vishwa club, which will carry out various activities, including facilitating electronic waste recycling, tree plantation drives, solar lamp posts installation, creating water reservoirs, rain water harvesting in rural areas, promote conservation of ground water and eco-friendly goods etc. to

showcase an extensive range of categories from eco-energy to eco-electronics for generating eco-friendly business solutions.

It will set up different types of committees, which will prepare a white paper and also will undertake an initiative to inform nature lovers on every environmental activity they conduct around the city.

"A lot is discussed in other conferences but who's adopting it--- there's always a missing link. We can't blame the government only for the problems but it's the common man who has to do something. Its not about countries, it's about humans, we have to join hands if we want to survive," states Dr Purushottam Rajimwale, director, ISVS.
